2023 EU-Taiwan Gender Equality Forum—Promoting Gender Equality Agenda

Preface

EU and Taiwan launched the gender equality cooperation in 2015. Sharing a common goal of promoting gender equality, we promote gender mainstreaming mechanisms, ensure LGBTI rights, increase gender balance in decision-making in public and private sector, eliminate gender stereotypes, and reduce gender segregation in education and careers. Through extensive cross-border gender equality issues, policies, and experiences exchange, we are jointly pursuing values of gender equality and human rights.

Taking stock of recent developments in the Asia-Pacific region, we have found that the Thai cabinet passed the "Civil Partner Bill" in June 2022, followed by Singapore's announcement of the repeal of laws prohibiting same-sex acts in August and Japan's launch of the Tokyo Partnership Oath System in November. It is evident that the rights of LGBTI in Asia have made concrete progress, and many countries are working tirelessly to advocate for and advance them. Despite these fruitful results, we still face challenges in achieving gender equality in the Asia-Pacific region. To move towards our vision of a diverse, respectful, and gender-inclusive society, we need to communicate and collaborate with each other more effectively.

The Forum in 2023 will serve as a platform where countries will take stock and exchange gender equality issues in response to the continued challenges of the pandemic and digital era. They will propose strategies and visions for promoting gender equality in the post-pandemic era. We deeply hope to expand the effects and driving the progress of gender equality and human rights in the Asia-Pacific region.
